While not visible in this photo, this attractively marked Jasta 37 Albatros DVa attributed to Karl Haustein has two large letters H on the top wing which would have been repeated on the lower wing. Note the Daimler - Mercedes radiator, rear view mirror ()— and black and silver Jasta 37 tallplane stripes. Unfortunately all we was recorded as being with Jasta 37 and later with Kest 46 from August to October 1918.








B Albatros D.Va, 'White 7', Jasta 37 late 1917

Use optional parts C1 D8 E46 F7 F8 E49 and Daimler Mercedes D.III 180hp engine.



The 'shooting star' or comet marking was a recurring theme for many young German airmen during the First World War (and the Second World War (2000). Note the flare rack (%2) beneath the ockpit. Like the other Jasta 3/habtros DVa machines in this decal set this machine features DV style V struts (%9). Unfortunately we do not have any information as to who flew this Jasta 37 Albatros DVa.









The fuselage marking of this Jasta 37 Albatros D.Va was a good luck symbol used by all sides during the First World War. The unusual feature of conventionally painted camouflage on the upper and lozenge on the lower wing surfaces is unusual not but unheard of. The white '9' and border to the crosses on the bottom wing indicate these were applied to a lozenge covered surface because they would be all black if applied to a light blue wing. Note the flare rack (644) beneath the cockpit and rear view mirror (E39) . Unfortunately we do not have any information as to who flew this Jasta 37 Albatros D.Va



Albatros D.Va, Max Näther, Jasta 62, mid 1918 (26 victories)





Max Nather's Jasta 62 Albatros DVa carries his personal marking of the Imperial German flag, later his Fokker DVII would be similarly decorated. A photo of this Albatros DVa appears in Cross & Cockade Journal volume 2 number 3 1983. Max was only 15 when he joined the infantry in late 1914. He transferred to aviation in 1917 and arrived at Jasta 62 on 31 March 1918.

when, following his 8th victory, he was made commander in July while still only 18 years old. He remained at Jasta 62 until the Armistice, bringing his total victory count up to 26 (more than half the total number of victories scored by Jasta 62). Max was shot down and killed by Polish ground fire during the border war on 8 January 1919. He was 20 years old.
