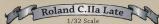

Before assembly select a marking option and note optional parts required in instructions.

Rigging: If installing rigging please drill out all location holes with a 0.5mm drill bit to a depth of at least 1mm.

ugging: It installing rigging please drill out all location noies with a 0.5mm drill bit to a depth of at least 1mm.

Tainting: Only use paints designed and suitable for plastic model kitsets.

cals: Cut out each decal as required. Soak in warm water for 15 seconds. Slide off backing paper onto gloss painted surface of model (not just clear coated plastic). For large decals it is helpful to apply a drop of water to the area they are being applied to. This will make it easier to maneuver them into the correct position.

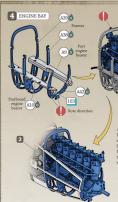

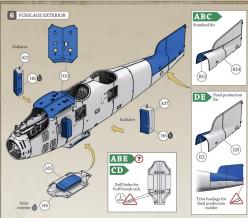

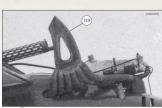












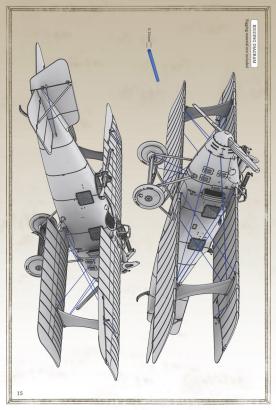
IMG 08 'Spandau' detail from a crashed early (not late) production Roland C.IIa showing the ammunition feed chute (12) and wing attachment details.

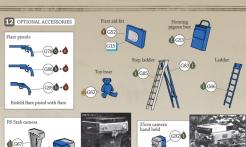

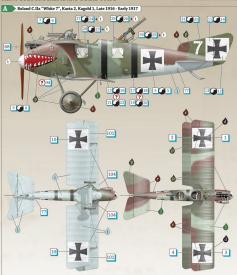

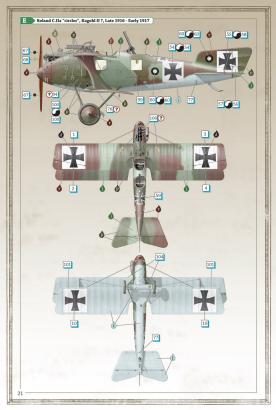

This Roland C.IIa (Li) has come to grief down a bank next to some railway tracks and is thought to be 1852/16, the 2nd aircraft from the first Linke-Hofmann production batch ordered in July 1916 (numbers 1851/16 to 1862/16). The wheels have been quartered in light and dark colours and an anemomenter was fixed to the starboard wing.



Note the PuW bomb rack (III) and hole cut in the fuselage for camera equipment. The large white cross fields seen behind the fuselage and wing eisemkreuz were phased out following a directive in late October 1916 and are unusual to see on Linke-Hofman built C.IIa which started to arrive at the front in February 1917.



This final production Boland C.I.a.
